Trope 7: Cannon Fodder

Vocabulary

Cannon Fodder: Soldiers regarded as just more

tools or material to be used in war.

Prowess: Expertise in a particular activity.

Vicarious: Felt or enjoyed through imagined participation in the experience of others.

Sadistic: Getting pleasure from inflicting pain or suffering on others.

Extra: A person in the background of a movie or television show that has no purpose other than to be

a member of a crowd.



1. Have you ever enjoyed a story that had lots of bad guys that the good guys could beat up? What are some examples of those types of bad guy characters?

You could list storm troopers from Star Wars, various Vikings from How to Train Your Dragon, orcs from The Lord of the Rings, and a lot of others, I'm sure!

Teacher's Note: There are many verses that talk about each person's value. These include: Genesis 1:26; Psalm 139:13-14; Isaiah 43:4; 1 John 3:1; 1 John 4:11; 1 John 4:16

2. Everyone you encounter has a soul. There's no such thing as a "background character" in real life. Have you ever treated someone like a background character without meaning to?

Perhaps you could mention how you may have treated people checking out your groceries or goods at a store. Is the voice on the other end of the drive-through speaker a person to you, or just a voice so you can get some food?

Use this to point out that even though we don't fight orcs every day (I'm assuming), sometimes we fall into thinking of other people as not really being people, but just background characters. But Jesus loved that person enough to die for them, too!

3. How many people did Jesus die for?

The point of this question is to get students thinking about how much Jesus loves even that person over there that you've never talked to before. Jesus cares about you. Yes! But he also loved the person in the car next to you enough to die for him. And he loved the woman who's walking her dog over there that you've never even said hi to. Each of those people is important to Jesus!

4. Is it ever okay to fight someone else?

God tells us to protect others. It takes wisdom to know how to do that well. He tells us not to act in anger, too. If we're fighting because we like fighting or out of selfishness or pride, we're sinning. But sometimes to protect others, we must stand between them and danger. We must defend others! And when we fail to do that, we turn to the cross. Jesus fought to defend us and laid down his life to protect us!

5. Are you unimportant? How could you encourage a friend when they might feel like "just an extra"?

No! You're so important that Jesus died for you!

You could tell your friend, "You are important! And Jesus didn't make a mistake. He knew you before you were born and thought you were that important. I'm not going to argue with Jesus! He knows what he's doing!"
